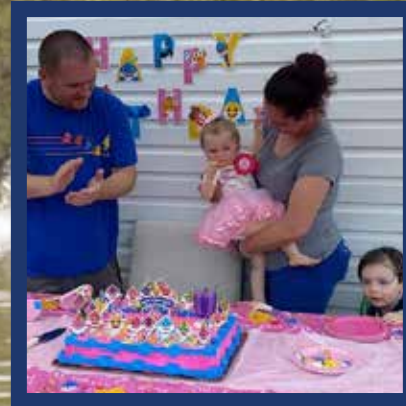

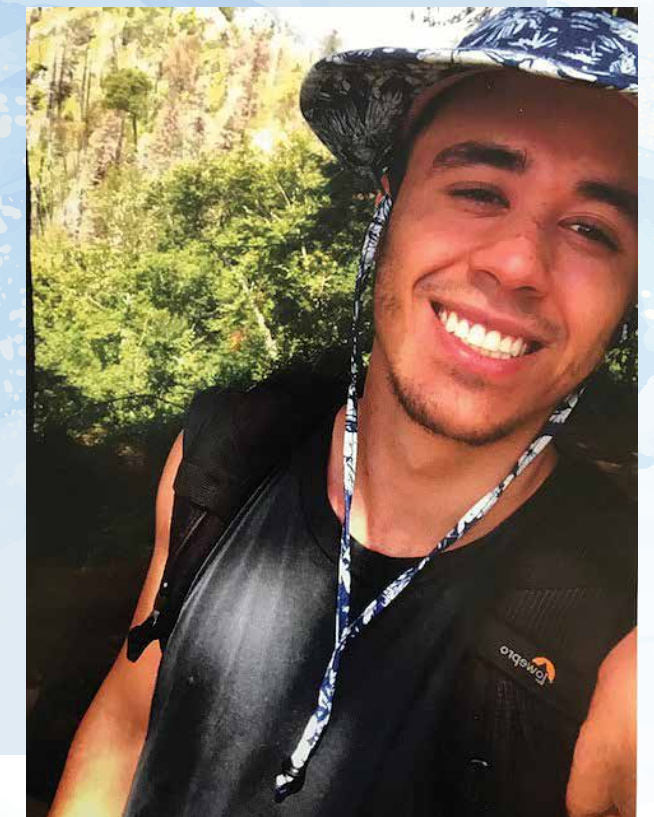
Dear donor family,

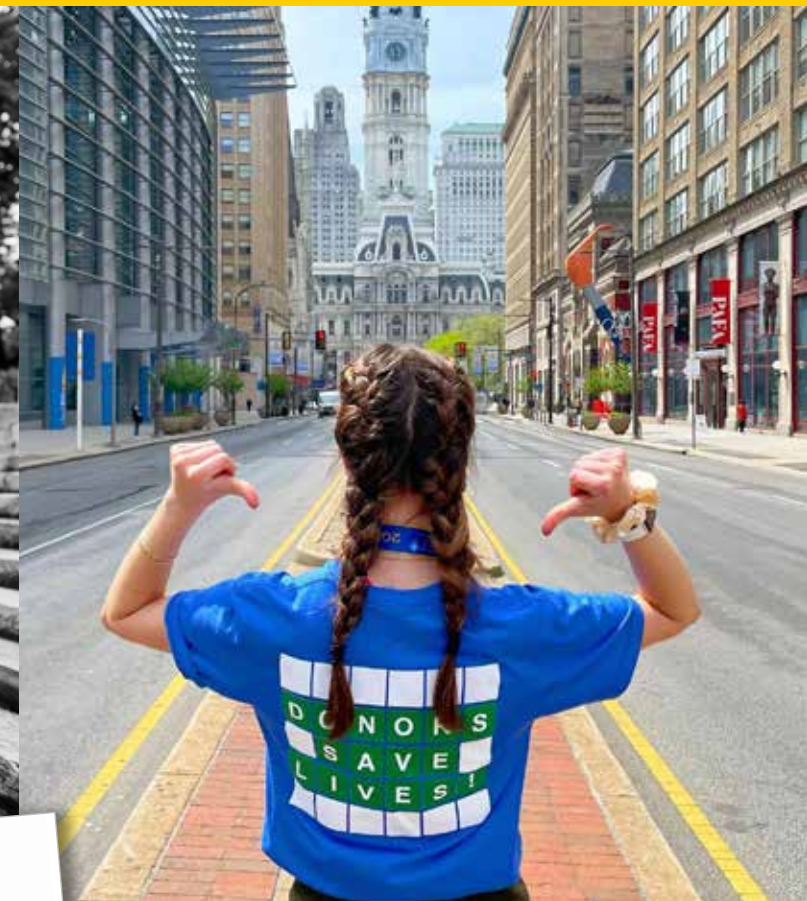

Donor family,  
My name is Alexandra; I'm a recent college graduate teaching at a charter school in NYC. First and foremost, I want to say thank you. Thank you for giving me back the gift of sight—something I have always taken for granted but never will again. Thank you for giving me back my confidence and restoring my faith.

I had just started my new teaching job back in the beginning of August, when two days in I noticed something was wrong with both of my eyes. Literally overnight I developed ulcers in both of my eyes. The left eye had 2 ulcers caused by bacteria and was under control and treated within a month with medication, but my right eye kept getting worse & worse with no corneal specialist in NY being able to diagnose me. I'll never forget the sinking feeling of despair I felt waking up one morning and realizing I had gone blind in my right eye.

Since I couldn't get the help I needed in NY, in September I traveled to Willis Eye Hospital in Philly. The amazing Drs. there determined I had a rare fungal infection and they did everything they could to try + treat it.

I was so scared for the surgery because my Dr. told me due to the severity of the infection, the likelihood of my eye rejecting the transplant was extremely high. Fast forward 2 months and (knock on wood) I could not have asked for a better outcome. My Drs. continue to be snacked with the rate my vision is returning and the way my eye is healing. I have recently returned to work and picked up where I left my life back in August.

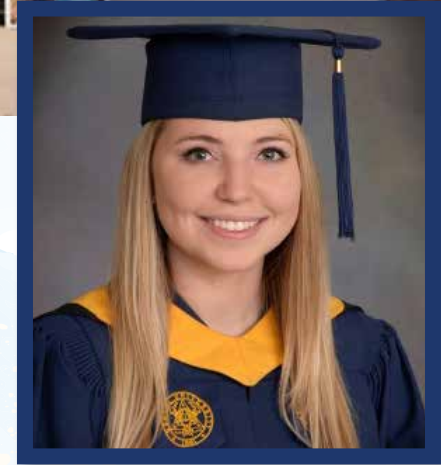

Dear Donor Family,

Because of the generosity of you and your loved one, I received my cornea transplant on March 15, 2016. It has taken me this long to come up with the right words to express my gratitude for this selfless gift. But please know, not a day has gone by since that I do not think about your loved one and your family and appreciate the precious gift I was given. I now know there are no right words so I will speak from my heart.

Thank you for the kindness that you were able to show beyond your grief. I am 34-years-old, and I have a disease called keratoconus. I knew it was only time before I would need to have a cornea transplant. I avoided it for over 2 years but once it affected my work, I knew it was time. In those 2 years prior to my transplant, I was a nurse working in a neonatal intensive care unit. It had gotten to the point where I could not safely perform my job and care for the premies and their families due to my poor vision, constant eye tearing, and sharp pain.

Now I have 20/20 vision in my right eye. I never imagined that would be possible. And that would not be possible without your loved one.

I can remember being in the pre-op area the day of my transplant, waiting to be taken back to the operating room and that is when it hit me and I started to cry. In order for me to be able to see again, another family would have to go through the unimaginable. And I am so sorry for your loss.

I hope that my constant thoughts of your loved one and your family, my deep appreciation for my gift of sight, and knowing that a part of your loved one will continue on will help to ease a little bit of your unthinkable pain.

To Our Donor Family:

First and foremost, we are so sorry for your loss and express our most sincere and deepest condolences. We know there is not much that can be said to comfort you in a time of loss and grief, but hope there is a bit of light in this darkness when you read about the difference your loved one has made.

My name is Stephanie, and I, along with my husband Dominic, are humbled by the selflessness of your family member and the choice to impact so many lives when they were no longer here and able to. As a result, the recipient of one of the corneas and of their generosity is our daughter, Elliana, who just turned one in May.

She was born two months premature with an unrelated, incredibly rare congenital eye condition called Peter's Anomaly. The irises and corneas of her eyes failed to develop the space between them that typically exists, causing scarring and opacities. Because her corneas were opaque and blocking her pupils, from what we were told, her vision was limited to light perception. Of course, this was not the journey Dominic and I anticipated we'd be on as first-time parents, but we made the decision early on to help Elliana be the best version of herself, no matter what that meant. After a long road of research and doctors' appointments, we found ourselves at Wills Eye in Philadelphia where we ultimately made the decision to go ahead with bilateral corneal transplants, despite the risks and odds of success not being in our favor. She had her first cornea transplant on December 13, 2017 in her left eye and her second on April 4, 2018 in her right eye.

While I will spare you additional details and emotions, I remember distinctly after that first surgery in December, once the swelling went down and she opened her left eye, that we learned they were brown, we felt as though we could see into her sweet soul, and the overwhelming emotion we felt, realizing that our daughter was given the gift of sight, is something we will never forget. This exact feeling was repeated after she received her second transplant; she would finally be given the opportunity to see more clearly and we could finally truly look into her eyes.

Elliana is learning so much more about her world through sight than we ever could have imagined or hoped for, and that is because of your loved one. She has had two clear

corneas for four months now and her world has become very different in the best way. While her vision will always be limited because of her anomaly, what she is capable of is not; the generosity of her donors gave her the chance she needed to reach her full potential. She currently wears two plastic shields taped to her face to protect her transplants, gets numerous steroid drops every day, makes biweekly (or sometimes more often) trips to Wills Eye from our home in Western New York, receives multiple early intervention services and recently had her fifth surgery for an exam under anesthesia and suture removal. Despite all of this, Elliana is the happiest, funniest and sweetest little girl. She is crawling around like a woman on a mission all of the time, (without running into anything), she loves to "cruise the couch," walk while holding your hands or using her push toy, dance to music, play with her toys, turn book pages, play peek-a-boo, is constantly on the move, and loves Veggie Straws and milk. She also loves to give herself kisses when she sees herself in the mirror!

So in a time of tragedy, I hope you can find some solace in the way our sweet baby girl Elliana's life has been so positively impacted. Words cannot adequately express my gratitude to your loved one, as they have given Dominic and I the gift of our daughter smiling when she sees our faces, not just when she hears our voices, something we weren't sure we would ever be able to experience. I also hope that you can find some comfort in knowing this blessing went to a child as young as ours because again, she is learning so much about her world as a result of her sight.

We have included some pictures of Elliana, so you can see the impact her donors have had on her life and on ours. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts, we are eternally grateful and again express our deepest condolences.

Please feel free to write back as we'd love to hear from you, but if not, please know we are always thinking of you, and each night we say how grateful we are for each day of sight Elliana is blessed with and what it means to our family. And without reference to religion, Dominic and I both lost our fathers, so we hope they are personally thanking your loved one.

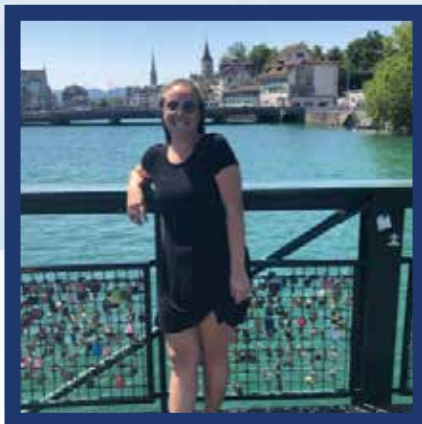
